

2019-20 access and participation plan monitoring Provider impact report

This impact report summarises the progress made by Bournemouth and Poole College, The against targets, objectives and written commitments set out in its 2019-20 access and participation plan. This document is a summary of information submitted by the provider to the OfS. This document is a self-report by the provider only and does not indicate any OfS assessment of compliance.

1. Ambition and strategy

Bournemouth and Poole College, The's ambition and strategy as detailed in the 2019-20 access and participation plan:

We have set challenging targets to ensure that our courses are accessible to all and that students are supported to have the best chance of success in achieving their desired career goals. In 19/20 these included with relation to Access to HE:

- Maintain/increase BME representation
- Maintain students with a declared disability representation
- · Increase female participation in full time courses
- · Increase ward uplift male representation
- Develop internal progression from feeder courses
- Maintain/increase adult learners returning to education in line with National targets and to address areas of skills gaps identified by the LEP.

Develop a close working partnership with SUN to improve our research base in terms of barriers to access and supporting current level 2 and level 3 cohorts into HE

Progress against actions

Some key actions in 2019/20 were based LEP priority areas and in particular to increase recruitment on STEM programmes which are a growth area for the College. Students on engineering programmes, including apprenticeships, make up just over 50% of our total HE cohort. However, these students are franchised with Bournemouth University so all the data surrounding access and participation of these high performing cohorts is not included in our data dashboard.

We have significantly improved the data we hold on students from low participation areas by working closely with our full time Southern Universities Network (SUN) Progression Officer who has been based in the College since 2018. Quantitative research into the potential barriers to progression to level 4 study has been undertaken with the SUN Progression officer. Interventions and support based on the research is on-going and the College has participated in outreach events which have specifically targeted NCOP Learners from feeder schools. In line with our HE Strategy 2019-21, we have raised awareness of our current Access to HE courses and increased the numbers of mature and adult learners onto those courses to further support widening participation.

Working with our internal students the College continues to make a significant contribution to widening participation. Extensive support measures are in place to support those from low

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participation backgrounds including extra support to achieve English and Maths, 1-1 coaching with the SUN progression officer, presentations from University partners and UCAS application support. UCAS data for 2019-20 shows that out of 437 students who applied to enter HE from the College in 2019-20, 27% were BAME students, 30% from POLAR4 Quintiles 4 and 5 and 64% from quintiles 1, 2 and 3.

Participation targets and actions

Maintaining achievement rates in excess of 90% to support progression has been a key priority. College internal data shows continuation rates on full time programmes has increased from 88.37% in 2018-19 to 90.12% in 2019-20. TEF4 data shows continuation rates overall for 2018-19 at 93.6% and the College had two green flags for above average performance against this metric.

The College has undertaken a range of initiatives to increase the take-up of study skill sessions for students delivered by the Learning Resources team to all HE and Access to HE students. The College has also developed extensive on-line and blended learning resources for part-time students or those who cannot regularly access College facilities including adults in employment.

Graduate Outcomes

The College has complied with all requirements to provide accurate information regarding graduates to enable robust data collection and liaised with HESA regarding the low response rate to the Graduate Outcomes survey. Historically the College has positive flags for progression, in part due to the excellent career progression of our part time franchised students. 2019-20 saw the development of the Career College strategy and embedding Gatsby benchmarks to support level 2 and 3 cohorts. The College continued to focus on embedding employability skills extensively within the curriculum to ensure high rates of progression into employment or further study. Work experience and live projects are a feature of all HE courses.

There is further work to do to improve graduate outcome response rates and to provide a coherent programme of career management support and entrepreneurship/self employment support for all students.

Bournemouth and Poole College, The's commentary where progress against targets was less than expected.

Target reference number: T16a_02

How have you met the commitments in your plan related to this target?

No because these targets were based on historic figures which were recalculated in subsequent plans. The 20-21 Access Plan reported that BAME students constituted only 10% of our HE population. The 2019-20 data dashboard shows a slight increase in the percentage of both Black and Asian students onto HE courses. Internal 2019-20 data shows 17 new entrants to FTHE out of 106 in total so we have an average of 16% accessing HE at the College. However the majority of work towards widening participation focuses on College applicants to HE in providers across the UK. UCAS destinations report shows an increase to an exceelent 27% for BAME students entering HE from the College.
